early childhood building blocks

What happens in the first five years of a child's life is - scientists, politicians and psychologists all agree - critical to their development. Where 19th century philosopher William James thought children's brains were just 'one great blooming, buzzing confusion,' neuroscientists today have shown just what a dynamic, complex environment they really are. Babies, says Harvard University's Professor Jack Shonkoff, are actually 'voracious learners...eager to master the world.' As part of the growing global debate on early childhood development (ECD), Kids' Stuff, **tve**'s new series of short, punchy vignettes, focuses on the basic ECD issues – the brain, nutrition, violence, child rights and interaction – affecting how children learn.

revolution on the world's rooftop

Life on the Edge was back on air on BBC World News in early September with 'Kung Fu Nuns', a stirring tale of revolution on the rooftop of the world – in Ladakh in the Indian Himalayas. In the Naro Photang nunnery in Shey, 150 nuns from the Drukpa order of Tibetan Buddhism are practising Kung Fu – once an almost exclusively male discipline. For centuries, Buddhist nuns were seen as second class and expected to perform menial chores for the monks. But then the Drukpa leader His Holiness the 12th Gyalwang Drukpa decided it was his karma to empower the women. Kunzang, the nunnery's Geyok - or deputy discipline master – describes the impact on their lives.

Our films don't only go out on television - they go much further. Last month, under a star-lit sky, 14,000 feet up in the Himalayas, 'Kung Fu Nuns' was screened twice to tens of thousands of people from India and 66 other countries at the world's largest gathering of Drukpa Buddhist masters, at the same nunnery where much of the film was shot. His Holiness the 12th Gyalwang Drukpa, the spiritual head of the Drukpa lineage, told **tve** he was thrilled with the film, and will have it shown at his monasteries, nunneries, and Buddhist centres around the world.
